It has been a tough last two years. COVID 19 has had a devastating impact on tourism, and the Chole Mjini Tree House Lodge was no exception.

The Lodge has always been the engine of the development project on Chole, supporting employment, procurement in the local community and, in partnership with The Chole Mjini Trust Fund - raising funds and helping facilitate project management with SHIMACHO* the implementing organisation on Chole.

COVID19 has made us acutely aware of the vulnerability of depending on tourism for sustainable livelihoods as people lost their jobs and were forced back to harvesting natural resources from the land and sea.

This has not been good for the environment which, together with the acceleration of changes arising from climate change, is putting the economic sustainability of life on Chole and the Mafia region at further risk.

We believe that this is a challenge that needs to become an integrated part of our future work.





4 / *What does the future hold?*

During the pandemic we were able to help Chole Island and neighbouring Jibondo Island join SMILO a global organization dedicated to networking small islands to address issues of sustainability.

Our village Chairman will soon be heading to Portugal to attend his first SMILO AGM. This a great start, but we see the need for practical projects which enable local people to marry sustainable utilisation of resources and conservation with the development of their community.



Over the next few months, we will be updating you about new plans for our work in Chole and the wider area.

Education will continue to be at the heart of this approach, allied with a conservation project on the inhabited islands in the Mafia Island Marine Park that we hope will help to sustain the environment for future generations of local people and visitors alike, and create sustainable employment into the future.

What have we been spending your money on?

Over the years, more and more children have been passing on to secondary school and tertiary education, and the cost of funding these activities continues to increase. At the same time, the collapse of tourism has badly impacted the income to the Trust.

We are experiencing the perfect financial crunch, but despite this we have continued to run the Chole Kindergarten and provide school scholarships to secondary and tertiary students into 2022.

The annual recurrent budget for Chole Mjini Trust Fund/ SHIMACHO activities is about TShs 125,000,000, or about £44,500/ \$53,000. We show how this is being spent on the next page.

Our Funding Challenge

Maintaining this level of support has had an inevitable impact on our reserves.

We have already had to take some tough decisions over the last two years including withdrawal of our support for the Health Centre, now handed over to the District Government to manage.

Now we are facing the prospect of the closure of the Learning Centre, which has key support role for students.

Without action, we will have to further reduce the support we can give. This is something we are obviously keen to avoid.



Our current forecasts suggest that we are going to hit a funding crisis in 2023, which over time will mean that we will not be able to support the same level of students.

We have to make decisions about how many students we can support by the end of 2022, so the time for action is now.

We therefore need to get creative about fundraising and we hope that you will be willing to be part of this effort in the coming weeks and months.

For now though, we would really welcome any offer of increased support for this valuable work. If you feel you are able to increase your support for the students of Chole, we would be immensely grateful.



7 / Please Donate

The huge difference in purchasing power between western economies and Tanzania means small amounts go a very long way.

- £ 15/ US\$25 per month will pay for a form 1-4 secondary school pupil's bursary to attend school on Mafia for a year;
- £ 35/ US\$55 per month will pay for a form 5+ secondary school or diploma pupil's bursary for a year on mainland Tanzania
- £ 70/ US\$110 per month will fund a student at university for a year, with half the amount advanced as a loan repayable on graduation to benefit later students.
- £100/US\$155 per month will fund an English Language Teacher in the Learning Centre
